Walter Ronnie Abwang
 Thesis Title: *Supply chain innovations & firm strategy: pathways to manage institutional voids in emerging markets. Case study of manufacturing firms in Uganda*

Ronnie Abwang completed his bachelor's degree in tourism (with honours) at Makerere University, Kampala, a Chartered Secretary of Southern Africa qualification, and an MBA before starting his PhD in 2016. While pursuing his PhD, he also completed an MSc in Public Health, focusing on developing countries' public health supply chains.

Ronnie Abwang's thesis focuses on institutional voids in the manufacturing sector in Uganda. The study identifies the different kinds of institutional voids using a dataset on 95 manufacturing firms in Uganda and investigates the approaches these firms use to ameliorate these voids. The study reports that manufacturing firms in Uganda have implemented innovations in their value chains that have significantly reduced the impact of manufacturing on the environment, created green jobs, and enhanced the livelihoods of local communities while simultaneously improving firm performance and lowering transaction costs. In addition, the study finds that manufacturing firms in Uganda use formal and informal strategies to address institutional voids, and there is no significant difference between how multinational corporations and family-owned businesses in Uganda respond to institutional voids.

Tania Bernadette Bowers

Thesis Title: *Developing an intersectionality framework for exploring gender dynamics at management level within a state-owned organization in South Africa*

Tania Bowers holds a BCom from the University of South Africa, specializing in Industrial and Organizational Psychology. She also completed a Postgraduate Diploma and MCom in Management Practice (specializing in Trade Law and Policy) at UCT's Graduate School of Business.

Tania's thesis examines the underrepresentation of Black women in South Africa in managerial roles within state-owned institutions and assesses the intersectional difficulties that Black women face in relation to their gender and racial identity. The study demonstrates that Black women's under-representation in management is a problem, and that SOCs are losing their capacity to support transformation. According to the report, SOCs undercut the promise of a just culture, to which South African Black women and society are constitutionally entitled. It also raises questions about the legitimacy of the decision-making power of women in leadership roles. To implement gender-sensitive regulations and practices, organizations must have stronger organizational leadership and legislative capacity with the political will to dismantle patriarchal leadership paradigms that impede women's socio-economic advancement.

Sydney Kabango Chishimba

Thesis Title: *The impact of household energy access on socio-economic outcomes in Zambia*

Sydney Chishimba holds a BA from the University of Zambia and an MA from the University of Dar es Salaam, Tanzania. Prior to pursuing his PhD studies, he served as a lecturer at the Copperbelt University in Zambia. In 2018, he joined the School of Economics to further his studies.

Sydney Chishimba examines

the impact of energy access on socioeconomic outcomes in Zambia. He compares the effects of grid and off-grid electricity on employment and income. Grid electricity has a stronger positive effect on income compared to solar home systems. He explores the influence of uninterrupted electricity service on education, employment, income, and alternative energy usage. Uninterrupted service improves employment outcomes and reduces reliance on alternative energy. He investigates the willingness of unconnected households to pay for grid and off-grid electricity, revealing that high-capacity solar home systems can be supplied by the private market, while low-capacity systems require credit or subsidies. Lastly, he demonstrates the importance of women's education, social networks, and employment in promoting transition to improved cookstoves and fuels. The thesis suggests that the Zambian government encourage a mix of grid and off-grid solutions, leverage private energy markets with financing, and empower women for a swift energy transition.
